

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

FESTIVAL ARTISTIC DIRECTORS



Susan Brooker is the Artistic Director of the American Ballet Theatre William J. Gillespie School in Costa Mesa California. She is a member of the ABT National Training Curriculum Advisory Committee, of the Artistic Board of Examiners and Instructors for the American Ballet Theatre, National Training Curriculum, and a guest teacher at the ABT Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis School, ABT Summer Intensive Programs and ABT Young Dancer Summer Workshops.

In 2000 Ms. Brooker was invited to the USA to teach on the faculty of the Hartt School Dance Division, University of Hartford, Connecticut, USA, she became Director of the School of Dance Connecticut in 2001 and Chair of the Dance Department of the Hartt School Community Division in 2004.

From 2008 – 2014 Ms. Brooker was Director of the BalletMet Dance Academy, Columbus OH. During her tenure at the Academy, she revised the school curriculum, and the ballet faculty became certified in the ABT NTC. Ms Brooker created the BalletMet Academy Pre-Professional Program (later Trainee Program), encompassing flexible credit courses for High School students and a certification course in the Primary - Level 3 ABT NTC.


In 2018 Susan Jaffe, then Dean of the UNCSA School of Dance, Winston Salem, NC, invited Ms. Brooker to be the Artistic Director of the UNCSA Preparatory Dance Program. Ms. Brooker introduced the ABT NTC to the Preparatory Dance Program with notable numbers of Prep. students entering the UNCSA High School and other professional training schools.

Ms. Brooker is a Fellow, and was a Major Examiner of the I.S.T.D. She holds the Enrico Cecchetti Diploma. She taught for many years in Italy as: Director of the Scuola di Danza Hamlyn di De Vita, Lukens, Florence, Italian Examinations Organizer for the I.S.T.D., Honorary President of the Cultural Association, Ateneo Danza, Forli, and Vice President of Danzare Cecchetti, A.N.C.E.C. of which she is still Italian delegate for Cecchetti International Classical Ballet. Students of Ms. Brooker have won prestigious international dance competitions including the Prix de Lausanne and are

dancing with companies in Europe, South America and the United States. Ms. Brooker has taught in schools in the USA,

Europe, Canada, and Japan and is a specialist in ballet pedagogy and curriculum development.

FESTIVAL ARTISTIC DIRECTORS



Donald Dadey began his studies in his native Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania under Jean Gedeon, John Occipintti, and Edward Caton. Upon receiving a full scholarship he furthered his studies In New York City at the School of American Ballet and studied at the Harkness House for the Arts. His professional career began at the age of 16 dancing with Pittsburgh Ballet Theater, Lyric Opera Ballet of Chicago under the direction of Maria Tallchief and worked with George Balanchine in the opera Orpheus and Eurydice. For the next several years his time was shared between the Dallas Ballet, The Chicago Lyric Opera Ballet, and the School of American Ballet.

In 1978 upon invitation from George Balanchine, he joined the Zurich Ballet in Zurich, Switzerland under the direction of Patricia Neary. He danced in over 20 ballets by Balanchine including leading roles in Stravinsky Violin Concerto, Liebeslieder Waltzer, Western Symphony, Episodes, and Allegro Brilliante. During his 10 years in Zurich he worked with and performed solo roles in works such as Five Tangos by Hans van Manan, Love Songs by William Forsythe, Death and the Maiden by Robert North, Die Schopfung by Uwe Scholz, Romeo and Juliet by John Cranko, Don Quixote by Rudolf Nureyev, Symphony in D and Transfigured Night by Jiri Kylian and Ghost Dances by Christopher Bruce. In 1983 he was invited by Karin von Alroldingin to the Paris Opera Ballet in Paris, France to assist in the staging of Balanchines Stravinsky Violin Concerto.

In 1988 he joined Ballet Arizona where he danced all leading roles as well as creating roles in many world premieres. He also appeared as Guest Artist" with Nevada Dance Theater in Las Vegas Suite, and as Romeo" in Romeo and Juliet. Most recently he has performed with Center Dance Ensembles productions of A Streetcar Named Desire as Stanley" and Count Dracula" in Dracula.

Mr. Dadey acted as Interim Artistic Director for the 1990 -1991 season, and Associate Artistic Director of Ballet Arizona from 1992 until his departure in 1997. His contributions included choreographing, staging repertory for the company, and founding the successful, Joy of Dance and Jump-start Programs, which are multi-faceted educational outreach programs for the public school system and inner-city children. He has taught as ballet instructor at Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute, The Dance Connection, Dance Theater West, New School for the Arts, Arizona State University, University of Arizona, Ballet Arts of Tucson, Pittsburgh Youth Ballet, and other schools. His choreographic credits include numerous works on Scottsdale School of Ballet, School of Ballet Arizona, Ballet Arizona, Zurich Ballet, Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute, Houston Dance Theater, New World Ballet, and Ballet Yuma and many world premieres for the leading Modern dance company in Phoenix, Center Dance Ensemble.

With his wife and co-director Sibylle Acatos-Dadey, he founded the Scottsdale School of Ballet in 2003 to continue training dancers for future generations. Aside from acting as a free-lance teacher, coach and choreographer, Mr. Dadey currently teaches at Impact Dance in Phoenix, Arizona. Mr. Dadey served as an in-person Evaluator for The Ballet Alliance in 2021 and has been a Festival Artistic Director for 2022, 2023 and 2024.

With a broad range of experience in artistic direction, executive leadership and organizational development, Hineline has a proven track record of strategically innovating and motivating organizations to achieve their missions while building relevant and sustainable futures.

An internationally sought-after choreographer, Alan Hineline's work is in the repertories of Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet, American Ballet Theatre Studio Company, Ballet de Monterrey, Ballet Philippines, Pennsylvania Ballet, ProDanza Cuba, Atlanta Ballet, Kansas City Ballet, Richmond Ballet, Sacramento Ballet, Juilliard Dance Ensemble, and Ballet Academy East, among many schools, colleges, universities and professional companies. As a teacher, Hineline has instructed every level of dancer, from beginner through professional. He is part of Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet's faculty and has been a guest faculty member for, among others, Ballet Academy East and The Juilliard School. Along with these fine schools he has taught at the Jackson International Ballet Competition, Aoyama Ballet Festival, and Jacob's Pillow Summer Dance Festival.

BALLET FACULTY



Lynne Charles

Lynne Charles was an international dancer and Ballerina for more than 35 years, dancing with such prestigious companies as the English National Ballet, Bejart Ballet, and Hamburg Ballet. She was the muse for J. Neumeier, M. Bejart, Roland Petit and many others. She was one of the first dancers to be invited to dance with the Kirov Ballet where she danced *Don Quixote* and *Giselle*. She was the only non-Russian dancer to be coached for *Giselle* by Galina Ulanova. She has performed all over the world and has an extensive repertoire.

Miss Charles is also an accomplished teacher having taught for schools and companies worldwide. She is also the creator of 4Pointe. 4Pointe is the result of witnessing the change in classical ballet training over the past twenty years. With input from newer and more contemporary choreographies, teaching styles have changed to be more dynamic and physically demanding. Dance has evolved significantly, yet in all of this development pointe training has remained largely the same or even fallen behind. Miss Charles felt that a new method of training on pointe was needed, a way in which to strengthen and develop certain areas of the foot that needed more precision and articulation. Miss Charles wanted to help dancers work on pointe in a more effective and healthy way, enabling dancers to adapt to the extreme physical requirements of today's choreography. She is excited to share her 4Pointe program with The Ballet Alliance.



Christopher Compton

Christopher Compton, an Assistant Professor at the University of Arizona School of Dance and Co-Director of Dance at Perry-Mansfield Performing Arts School and Camp, boasts a multifaceted career encompassing teaching, choreography, and performance. With an MFA in Dance from the University of Arizona and a BFA in Ballet from the University of the Arts where he was awarded the Aleksei Judenic Ballet Prize. Compton's training at Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet under Marcia Dale Weary, Darla Hoover, and Alan Hineline, and under Andrew Pap at UArts informs his expertise in Ballet Technique, Repertory, Partnering, Modern Dance, Choreography, and Dance History. Compton has performed principal roles in the esteemed works of Twyla Tharp, George Balanchine, and Paul Taylor, among others. He's performed on stages nationwide, including with the renowned Pennsylvania Ballet, and Koresh Dance Company. Noteworthy accomplishments include performing in

Twyla Tharp's Tony-Award-winning "Movin' Out" and portraying 'Johnny' in the North American Premiere of "Dirty Dancing."

In addition to his performance career, Compton's choreography has garnered recognition, earning him prestigious awards such as the Creative Achievement Award from the University of Arizona. His

His works have been showcased at esteemed venues like The Stevie Eller Theatre in Tucson and The Drake Theatre in Philadelphia. Compton's influence extends beyond the stage, with appearances in commercials and promotional materials for notable productions and institutions.



Jamie A. Johnson

Jamie A. Johnson is an Associate Professor of Dance and incoming Chair of the Department of Dance at Utah Valley University. Since 2015, she has served as the Co-Artistic Director of Repertory Ballet Ensemble, a student ensemble of dance majors, who perform classical and contemporary works in venues locally and nationally. Johnson's teaching is informed by her professional performing experience. After graduating cum laude from the University of Utah with degrees in Ballet and English, she went on to perform nationally and internationally with companies such as-Sacramento Ballet, Ballet Pacifica, Ohio Dance Theatre, and Boulder Ballet, reaching the status of principal dancer. Later with MOMIX, she served as Dance Captain and performed upon world-renowned stages, such as the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., the Joyce Theater in New York, and Teatro Municipal in Rio de Janeiro. Johnson's diverse repertoire includes works by Gerald Arpino, George Balanchine, Seán Curran, Doris Humphrey, Louis Falco, Moses Pendleton, Marius Petipa, Michael Smuin, Helen Tamiris, and Doug Varone. Jamie is a prolific choreographer and dance scholar. Her choreography has been performed by St. Paul Ballet, Utah Metropolitan Ballet, Boulder Ballet II, and the University of Wyoming. As a dance scholar, Johnson explores dance and diversity. Johnson's publications appear in the Journal of Dance Education and the Journal of Utah Arts, Sciences, and Letters, where she investigates inclusive dance pedagogy. She holds an MFA in Dance from the University of Washington with additional certifications in Yoga and Functional Awareness®.

Melody Mennite

Melody Mennite trained at Santa Cruz Ballet Theatre under Robert Kelley and Diane Cypher and at Pacific Northwest Ballet. She also attended summer intensive programs with Suzanne Farrell. Mennite attended three consecutive summer intensive programs at Houston Ballet's Ben Stevenson Academy, starting at the age of 13. She then spent one year in Houston Ballet II on full scholarship and stipend, also winning a scholarship award from Regional Dance America/Pacific. She joined the company at the age of 17 and rose through the ranks quickly, achieving Principal dancer status in 2008. The 2023-2024 season is Melody's 22nd with Houston Ballet. With Houston Ballet, Melody has originated many roles and performed all of the leading classical roles in the company's repertoire.

In 2015, Mennite Co-Founded and Directed REACH - a choreographic project that curates evenings of world premieres by emerging choreographers and designates all proceeds for arts education programs in underserved schools. Following the success of REACH, Mennite and her colleagues were invited to collaboratively create a world premiere for a theatre in the round at the George R. Brown Convention Center, for Houston Ballet. As a choreographer, Mennite has created 16 commissioned works, including Ana for Ballet Arkansas, Next of Kin for Houston Ballet Academy, Own commissioned for Kingwood Dance Theatre which won a Regional Dance America award, The 64 and 91 for Kansas City Ballet, We all are for Contingent Ballet in 2020, Nostalgia de los montañas for Houston Chamber Orchestra Festival, and You and me and the waves for Houston Ballet, among others. She was the choreographer, lead actor, and dancer in the award-winning film Self Sabotage, which was the short film category winner for the Festivus Film Festival in 2012.

Mennite is on the faculty of Kinder High School for the Performing and Visual Arts, and has taught master classes for Houston Ballet and Houston Ballet Academy, Ballet Arkansas, Vitacca Ballet, Santa Cruz Ballet Theatre, Huang Ballet School, Chunner Studio in New York, Perry Mansfield, and Kingwood Dance Theatre.



Derek Reid

Derek Reid began his training at the Jones-Haywood School of Ballet in his birthplace, Washington, D.C. He earned his B.F.A in Dance Performance from Butler University in 1987 and his MA in Organizational Leadership and Development from Gonzaga University in 2010. Mr. Reid's professional dance career, spanned a variety of countries and cultures, including Louisville Ballet, Pennsylvania Ballet, Dance Theatre of Harlem, Les Grands Ballets Canadiens in Montreal, Quebec and Ballet Met in Columbus, Ohio. He created leading roles in works by internationally acclaimed choreographers, among them Choo San Goh, William Forsythe, Jiri Kylian, Nacho Duato, James Kudelka, Mark Morris, and Ohad Naharin. His repertoire ranged from the classical to the contemporary and included a fusion of cultural representations.

Following a successful and fulfilling professional career, Mr. Reid was named Associate Director of the Fort Wayne Ballet in 2000. In 2004, Mr. Reid transitioned to higher education, leaving Fort Wayne and joining the faculty at his alma mater, Butler University. As Professor of Dance, Mr. Reid teaches Ballet History, Classical Ballet Technique, Classical and Contemporary Pas de Deux, Choreography, and Black Dance in the American Tradition, a Perspectives in the Creative Arts core curriculum course that explores developments in American culture from its interactions with African and African American culture

In spring 2022, Mr. Reid became the Associate Dean of Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Access for the Jordan College of the Arts at Butler University. In this role, Mr. Reid is charged with building a diverse community within the arts college where each member feels empowered and enabled to contribute to the greater arts community. Mr. Reid's passion and love for art's ability to make us think critically and his commitment to serving his community, will continue to guide his efforts in bringing about change as they relate to Dance and the embracing of Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Access.

Lisa Slagle

Lisa Slagle received her early dance training in both southern California and Texas. She began her professional dancing career at the age of 11 when she appeared as a solo dancer in the Elvis Presley movie, "Clambake". Upon graduation from high school she was offered a position with the Joffrey Ballet in New York, where she stayed until 1979. While there she had the opportunity to perform leading roles in ballets by choreographers Agnes de Mille, Gerald Arpino, Frederick Ashton, August Bournonville and Twyla Tharp. In the 1980's she performed as a Soloist with the Ballet du Grande Theatre de Geneve in Switzerland, under the direction of Oscar Araiz, and as a Principal Dancer with Tulsa Ballet Theatre under the direction of Roman Jasinski and Moscelyn Larkin.

Upon her retirement from dancing, she started teaching ballet in the Dallas area, and in 1999 became the founding director of the Ballet Academy of Texas. In her 22 years as Director, the Academy received "Outstanding School" awards from the Youth America Grand Prix organization on multiple occasions, and Ms. Slagle the "Outstanding Teacher" award in the Southwest area. In 2001 she founded the pre-professional company, Ballet Ensemble of Texas, which was an Honor Company with the Regional Dance of America organization for her 13 years as director. Many of her students are now dancing professionally in such companies as American Ballet Theatre, Texas Ballet Theatre, and Sarasota Ballet.

Ms. Slagle was asked to be on the Advisory Board for American Ballet Theatre's National Training Curriculum in 2007. Since 2007 she has taught for ABT as a Master Teacher for their various Summer Intensive workshops, and as an Artistic Coordinator for their Young Dancer Workshop in Dallas in 2018 and 2019. She has staged her choreography and been a Master Teacher for such noted national schools as the Orlando Ballet School, Washington School of Ballet, Oklahoma City Ballet, and the Interlochen School of the Arts in Michigan. She has been an adjudicator for Regional Dance America's Northeast (2018) and Midstates Regions (2020). Most recently she was a judge for the American Dance Competion/International Ballet Competition in Florida, and is looking forward to being an Adjudicator for The Ballet Alliance starting in 2025.



Christa St. John

Christa St. John is an Assistant Professor of Ballet, incoming Ballet Program Coordinator, and Co-Artistic Director of Repertory Ballet Ensemble at Utah Valley University (UVU). In addition to directing the company, she teaches ballet choreography, pointe, ballet technique, and dance theory courses, mentors emergent student choreographers and scholars, and regularly presents scholarly and creative works at national and international festivals, conferences, and performance venues. Christa's appointment at UVU follows a professional ballet performance career that spanned over a decade and four years as a division director of an integrated academic and ballet conservatory for preprofessional dancers. She began her performance career after joining Ballet Chicago and went on to dance with Ballet Austin, Louisville Ballet, Charleston Ballet Theatre, Atlantic City Ballet, and Northwest Florida Ballet. Throughout her career, she worked with renowned national and international artists and performed diverse contemporary and classical repertoire. Christa's professional choreographic career began in 2014, after being commissioned to create her own full-length version of The Nutcracker for Ballet Indiana. Since then, she has premiered numerous works and frequently collaborates with artists across disciplines in music, theatre, opera, and visual arts. In addition to her work at UVU, Christa teaches masterclasses across the US and regularly serves as a faculty member and choreographer for Joffrey Ballet's summer intensive programs. She is also a Dance for Parkinson's Disease instructor with teacher training through the Mark Morris Dance Group in Brooklyn, NY. Christa holds an MFA in Dance from the University of Oklahoma.

CHOREOGRAPHY & PROCESS

Choreography and Process (taught by Eva Stone) is designed to introduce the basic concepts of choreographic practice and exploration. Students will explore the three elements of dance (time, space, and energy) and learn how to utilize movement as a language to share and express thematic ideas. We will discover ways to access creativity, how to use the body as an inventive tool, and take a deep dive into the expressive nature of dance making. This course is both lecture and practice, so bring a notebook and writing tool.



Eva Stone

Eva Stone received a BFA in Performance and Choreography from Arizona State University. After completing a Master of Arts degree in Choreography and Choreological Studies from the Laban Centre in London, England, she formed The Stone Dance Collective. Eva relocated to Seattle in 1995, re-established her company, and began an extensive teaching and lecturing career throughout the Pacific Northwest and the US. She is currently on faculty at Pacific Northwest Ballet School where she initiated New Voices: Choreography and Process for Young Women in Dance, a nationally recognized program specifically designed to educate and mentor the next generation of female choreographers. Eva was awarded a choreographic residency for the National Choreographers Initiative at UC Irvine and the UNCSA Choreographic Institute. Since 2009, Eva has been annually invited as guest faculty and commissioned choreographer for The Ballet Alliance.

In 2019 Eva created F O I L, a mainstage work commissioned by Pacific Northwest Ballet with excerpts presented as part of PNB's 20/21 Digital Season and the Ballet Sun Valley Dance Festival. Eva's work has been commissioned by Spectrum Dance Theater, Seattle International Dance Festival, Eugene Ballet, and by dance companies across the US. Her other projects include assisting Donald Byrd for the Seattle Opera production of Aida and choreographing over 25 award-winning musical theatre productions. Most recently, Eva was commissioned by Olympic Ballet Theatre for their 23/24 season. Eva is also the founder, producer, and curator of CHOP SHOP: Bodies of Work, an annual contemporary dance festival that features local, national, and international dance artists as well as classes, lectures, and community-based programs.

This seminar trains dancers to become INCLUDE Dance Partners, who serve as assistants and supporters to dance students with disabilities. Dancers will receive the necessary information and learn a variety of strategies and tools to be successful Dance Partners in the INCLUDE Program.



Rebecca Rogo

Rebecca Rogo is the founder of INCLUDE, a program for individuals with disabilities to participate in adaptive dance classes and to attend sensory-friendly performances with their families. She is an alumna of Mid-Columbia Ballet where she now holds the position of Artistic Assistant and INCLUDE Director. Rogo received her Master of Education degree from the University of Washington in Seattle, where she assisted the Seattle Children's Theatre in mounting their first sensory-friendly performance. In 2014, Rogo attended the Sensory-Friendly Performance Summit at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington D.C. where she was invited to speak to members of the international theatre community about the importance and necessity of accessibility of performing arts programming for individuals with disabilities and their families. Rogo was invited by her former mentors at the University of Washinton to sit on an advisory board for Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI) and work as a Regional Engagement Coordinator to determine research priorities regarding community-level interventions as determinants of health, well-being and quality of life for children and their families. Upon returning to full-time ballet teaching for the Tri-Cities Academy of Ballet in 2016, she developed the INCLUDE (Inspiring, with No Challenges or Limitations, the Universality of Dance Experiences) program. In 2017, Rogo attended the Boston Ballet Adaptive Dance training and was invited to be a presenter at the Dance Educators Association of Washington Conference. In addition to directing INCLUDE at Mid-Columbia Ballet, she has trained other ballet companies to establish their own INCLUDE programs.

GYROKINESIS®

GYROKINESIS® Class with Francisco Graciano The Gyrokinesis Method was developed by a former professional dancer, Juliu Horvath, who drew on his studies of Tai Chi, Yoga, and dance to create a movement method that addresses the entire body. In this class we will open energy pathways and stimulate the nervous system. Consistent practice of Gyrokinesis increases range of motion and creates functional strength through rhythmic, flowing movement sequences. It is an original and unique method which coordinates movement, breath and mental focus. Video and audio recording is not allowed.

Francisco Graciano is a native of south Texas. He danced professionally with esteemed companies such as Ben Munisteri Dance Company, Cortez & Co. Contemporary/Ballet, Pascal Rioult Dance Theater, and Taylor 2. He is also a founding member of TAKE Dance Company and Dusan Tynek Dance Theater. Mr. Graciano's virtuoso talent was recognized by The New York Times as a "virtuoso star" during his time with the Paul Taylor Dance Company from 2004 to 2017. After retiring from the Taylor company, Francisco earned his MFA in Dance from Florida State University in 2020. Francisco's choreography has captivated audiences at renowned national venues and has been commissioned by various prestigious organizations including Dance Lab New York, Battery Dacne Festival, Austin Dance Festival, Provincetown Dance Festival, Nantucket Dance Festival, WestFest Dance Festival, and the 50th Annual Cervantino Festival. He proudly carries on the Taylor legacy by serving as a repetiteur and faculty member at the Taylor School. Notable collaborations include working with artists Jacob Jonas, Jordan Matter, and Robert Wilson and has created solo works for principal dancers of the Martha Graham Dance Company and Paul Taylor Dance Company. Francisco serves as a Program Coordinator for Dance on Camera Festival at Lincoln Center, where he curates programming and moderates filmmaker discussions. Additionally, he is an Assistant Professor of Dance at Sam Houston State University in Texas, and is a licensed GYROTONIC® and GYROKINESIS® trainer.

At Columbia Dance our mission is to present dance as a life-enhancing experience for our students and our community by setting high artistic standards in classical ballet education and performance, while creating a positive, nurturing, and challenging environment where dance appreciation thrives. Our focus is on mentoring youth. We believe wholeheartedly in the positive impact dance has on our students' lives, both inside and outside of the dance studio. The combination of physical exertion and artistic expression in dance classes cultivates numerous physical and mental benefits . . . discipline, self-motivation, self-esteem, stress relief, the list goes on and on. We also believe in bringing the benefits of dance to as many people as possible through outreach, summer programs, partnerships, performances, financial aid, and ticket donations.

Each season, we present a full-length Nutcracker to our community. In 2022 we debuted our brand new, historically inspired Nutcracker based on the history of Fort Vancouver in the 1840s. Historical characters attend the party. A battle ensues between fur trappers and beavers, highlighting the role the fur trade played in our town's history. And a Moon Woman, inspired by Ilchee, a powerful and independent Chinookan woman, calls out the moon to shine light upon the dancing snowflakes. Act 2 has castaways, voyageurs, clerks, Oregon trail children, and even a dancing salmon. We were privileged to collaborate with curators at the National Park Service/Fort Vancouver Historic Site as well as local tribal and cultural entities. We also collaborated with our local public school district on a 4-class 3rd grade curriculum about our Nutcracker which culminates with the students attending a live performance. We have over 1,700 elementary students participate yearly, learning about costume and set design, choreography, pantomime, and more.

In 2022 we launched our INCLUDE program. Our INCLUDE classes are designed for accessibility and equal participation in dance for all dance students. This class promotes an accessible environment that integrates the experiences of children with and without disabilities. We also host a Sensory Friendly performance of our Nutcracker each year as part of INCLUDE.

We are thrilled to be attending this festival and grateful for all that The Ballet Alliance offers our students and our organization.



Whidbey Island Dance Theatre (WIDT) was founded in 1993 with a love for dance. Back then it was known as Whidbey Dance Theatre, and it began with the idea of creating a new and exciting opportunity for young people in its community; young creatives of all ages, who also loved dance, could find their place on stage with their peers.

Hard work paid off. As the company moved forward and found its legs, it provided real, pre-professional dance experience to outstanding young dancers. Its participation in the wider world of dance followed. The juried, national association of ballet companies, "Regional Dance America," chose WIDT as an RDA performing company from 2001-2012. Since 2000, WIDT has performed throughout Washington, as well as in Arizona, California, Utah, Oregon, at the National Dance Festival in Pittsburgh, PA, and in Montreal, Canada. Through the years, both professional and community choreographers have expressed their appreciation for the generations of talented dancers they've worked with at WIDT.

Each year, WIDT graces the stage with two major productions, The Nutcracker and A Celebration of Dance, its springtime performance of new choreography. Both highlight the diverse talents of its broadly trained dancers and feature the works of both resident and guest choreographers. These productions are a gift, 30 years of WIDT making the creative, athletic, joyful and fun-to-watch magic that is dance!

Whidbey Island is about an hour drive north of Seattle, with a 20-minute ferry ride from Mukilteo to Clinton on the south end. The island is 55 miles long and between 1 and 10 miles wide. The largest population center is at the north end at Oak Harbor, which is accessible also by the Deception Pass Bridge. WIDT is located at the south end in Langley. The company's main performance venues are South Whidbey High School Auditorium, a 400-seat theater, and Whidbey Island Center for the Arts, which holds 250 seats.
